

ACRPC UPDATE

Municipal Energy Resilience Program (MERP) Grants Awarded-ACTION NEEDED!

More than \$3 million in MERP Implementation Grants have been awarded across 10 Addison County municipalities. These include:

- **Orwell:** Firehouse, Clerk's Office, Town Garage and Sewer Plant
- **Ripton:** Fire Station, Community House
- Leicester: Town Hall, Town Office
- Starksboro: Food Shelf
- Goshen: Town Hall
- **Ferrisburgh:** Town Hall and Offices
- Vergennes: Bixby Library
- **Bristol:** Holley Hall
- **Bridport:** Town office, Town Highway Garage
- Whiting: Town office and Town Hall



An Executed Grant Agreement AND Affirmation of Use of Funds document must be filled out and returned to BGS by Implementation Grant Awardees **BEFORE 12/16/2024** (OR BGS WILL RE-ALLOCATE Grant Agreements and Award Letters have been sent to awardees.

Grantees are only required to complete the scope of work to the extent that their funding under this agreement allows. The Grantee is required to utilize awarded funds in the energy conservation measure priority order that is referenced in Act 172.

Additional Federal Funds for Energy Improvements

For municipalities not lucky enough to get MERP grants, (or possibly for MERP recipients that want to do more work), The Vermont Municipal Bond Bank has \$40,000,000 of federal funds available to it to loan to municipalities for energy improvements at very attractive interest rates (about 2%).

We recognize this is not a grant. However, a lot of you have put a lot of work into evaluating the energy efficiency improvement possibilities for your municipal buildings. We expect some of you have identified projects with relatively short payback periods. We want to encourage you to look at this funding with those projects in mind. If they are good enough, it may be possible with these interest rates to create a project with a positive cash flow from day one (i.e. the monthly cost of paying principal and interest on the funds borrowed to implement the efficiency measure are less than the monthly savings from the measure). You have already done a lot of the work. If you are interested in exploring this alternative, please contact Adam Lougee at alougee@acrpc.org

Vergennes-Ferrisburgh Transportation Oriented Development Master Plan December 9-12 Design Charrette Events

The City of Vergennes and the Town of Ferrisburgh are working on the Vergennes-South Ferrisburgh Transit-Oriented Development Master Plan for the north-eastern portion of Vergennes and the southern portion of Ferrisburgh around the train station. As part of this effort, the design team from Toole Design is seeking input from residents, landowners, businesses, and area developers.

The Design Charrette (workshop) will be held from December 9-12, 2024, at the Vergennes City Hall. Here the design team will provide an overview of the effort to create a Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Master Plan around the train station area located in south Ferrisburgh near Vergennes. We will also discuss challenges and opportunities to development in the regional market and how those might apply to the Vergennes-South Ferrisburgh study area. In the end, our goal is to provide a comprehensive Transit-Oriented Development Master Plan

supported with regulatory zoning recommendations for each community.

You are invited to participate in this process at one of 3 events being held at the **Vergennes City Hall, 120 Main Street, Vergennes-** please join us for:

- Tuesday, December 10, from 12:00 1:00 pm: a Visioning Session open to the public to outline desired outcomes.

- Thursday, December 12, 2024, at 6:00 pm: a Public Open House where the design team will present draft concepts for community feedback.

Otter Creek Basin Clean Water Service Provider Call for Proposals

The Addison County Regional Planning Commission (ACRPC), in its role as the Clean Water Service (CWSP) Provider for Basin 3, the Otter Creek, Lewis Creek, and Little Otter Creek watersheds, is issuing a request for proposals for projects that improve water quality in Basin 3. Any proposed projects must be consistent with the Clean Water Initiative Program (CWIP) Funding Policy. Applicants must consult with DEC staff on potential project impacts on natural resources, like wetlands or river corridors and to give DEC 30 days to review project impacts. Projects

must be in keeping with the vision set forth by Act 76, the Clean Water Service Delivery Act, and policies and guidance set forth by the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation to implement the Act. Application Due Date is: **December 17**, **2024**

GRANT & FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Municipal Planning Grants

Municipal Planning Grants help Vermont's cities, towns and villages adapt to change and prepare for the future. This flexible State funding for planning and resilience can pay for a variety of eligible projects, such as:

- A new or updated municipal plan;
- New or updated bylaws that that implement Act 47 of 2023 (HOME Act) and Act 181 of 2024 (Resilience, Biodiversity & Land Use Act), including zoning & subdivision bylaws;
- Climate resilience and flood recovery projects;
- Projects related to **housing** development;
- New or updated capital programs and budgets for infrastructure maintenance and improvements:
- Physical improvement plans or other planning for a State
 Designation in coordination with Department of Housing & Community
 Development program staff; and
- <u>Projects that support communities for all ages that align with Age Strong Vermont: A Roadmap for an Age-friendly State.</u>

Individual towns may apply for up to \$30,000, and multi-town applications (a consortium) may apply for up to \$45,000. A local cash match of 10% of the total project costs is required, except for zoning/subdivision bylaw projects in municipalities without zoning/subdivision bylaws. Please review the Program Description for eligibility requirements and the Application Guide for application questions. A wide variety of municipalities access this funding, including the Vermont's smallest towns.

Application Schedule for FY2025 Grants:

- Regional Planning Commission confirmation of municipal planning process (to be eligible to apply for projects other than a municipal plan): **December 31, 2024**
- Online application opens for use: January 27, 2025
- Application Deadline: March 31 @ 6:00 p.m., 2025
- Award Decisions: April 30, 2025

VTrans is now accepting grant applications for the SFY 2025 Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) and the Municipal Highway and Stormwater Mitigation Program (MHSMP) grant opportunities concurrently.

This year over \$4.3 million of TAP grant funding is available for all eligible activities as described in the Vermont Transportation Alternatives Application Guide included in the link below. Approximately 50% of TAP grant program funds are reserved for pollution mitigation projects relating to stormwater and highways, including eligible salt and sand shed projects.

Approximately \$1.5 million of MHSMP grant funding is available for eligible stormwater pollution mitigation projects as described in the Municipal Highway and Stormwater Mitigation Program Guide which can be found in the MHSMP link below.

Weatherization Repayment Assistance Program (WRAP)

The Weatherization Repayment Assistance Program (WRAP) may be able to help you. WRAP is intended to assist both homeowners and renters in Vermont in pursuing home weatherization projects by allowing them to pay for the costs over time through a low-interest monthly charge on their utility bill.

WRAP assists with projects like insulation and air sealing a well as heat pumps, electric water heaters and advanced wood heating systems.

Vermont Urban and Community Forest Program Grants

Over \$430,000 will be available through two separate categories to support local tree planting and enhancement of healthy urban tree canopy in priority statewide. Both grant categories are open and accepting applications. The two grant categories have the same application deadline of January 10th, 2025 and neither cost-share requirement. However, the categories different award amounts, geographic eligibility criteria, and are administered and supported by different entities.

Tree Maintenance & Removal Grants: Supports local efforts to maintain a healthy urban tree canopy and address dead and high-risk trees in disadvantaged communities. \$119k available, min. \$5k, max \$20k

Community Tree Planting Grants:
Supports tree planting projects in high priority areas across Vermont to increase urban tree canopy and improve water quality and public health by controlling stormwater. \$315k available, min. \$5k, max \$75k

an incredible opportunity for small towns and rural communities in Vermont! The ERA program plans to support the demonstration of energy technologies that provide clean, resilient, reliable, affordable power, while also aiming to increase local energy independence and economic development.

Eligible projects must address at least one of the following:

- Improving overall costeffectiveness of energy generation
- Transmission, or distribution systems
- Siting or upgrading transmission and distribution lines
- Reducing greenhouse gas emissions from energy generation in rural or remote areas
- Providing or modernizing electric generation facilities
- Developing microgrids; or increasing energy efficiency

It is anticipated that there will be 16-69 projects, offering a range of funding from \$2-50 million each with a 5-50% minimum non-federal cost share per project.

Concept papers are due by February 27, 2025, and full applications are due by August 28, 2025.

Land and Water Conservation Fund

Over \$3 million available to support the development of public outdoor recreation opportunities across Vermont, with a focus on creating parks and open spaces, enhancing recreation areas and facilities, and protecting wilderness areas and forests.

Eligible applicants: Municipal entities and state agencies only (e.g. towns, cities, school districts, water districts, park districts, etc.)

Grant amounts: Recommended request range \$25,000-\$1,000,000 - 50% match required
