Jolyon is the Energy Planner for the Addison County Regional Planning Commission, and he joins the RPC after completing more than a decade of public affairs study. He obtained his B.A. in Politics from Hendrix College in 2016, and studied public policy analysis and economics while completing his degree. He obtained his Masters in Public Affairs from Indiana University's O'Neill School for Public and Environmental Affairs in 2018, at which he specialized in Energy Policy analysis. Finally, he completed his Ph.D. in Natural Resources at the University of Vermont in 2024, for which he examined system governance from a policy, process-, and structure-based perspective.

His research includes studies on the democratic advantages of wildlife habitat conservation via public land trusts in the U.S., on the impact of governance process contexts on the frequency of environmental justice conflict reports globally, on the impact of the federated energy planning structure in Vermont on energy plan cohesion, and on a variety of similar energy and environmental governance topics.

He has obtained membership in both the political science and the public administration academic honor societies, and is a member of the American Political Science Association and the Project Management Institute as well. Jolyon is interested in good governance theory and practice, in socially responsible and environmentally sustainable energy systems, and in systems thinking more broadly.

Does your town need a part-time zoning administrator?



ACRPC recently met with several towns within the region about the possibility of aggregating their part-time zoning administrator positions into one full time position administered through ACRPC.

ACRPC would hire a full-time position to serve each of the towns for the hours that each town needed. The salary, benefits, and overhead for the position would be paid by each town in proportion to the amount of work they contracted. Potential benefits of this approach would include a full-time, long term, professional zoning administrator supported by and administered through ACRPC.

GRANT & FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Municipal Planning Grants

Applications Due March 31, 2025

Municipal Planning Grants help Vermont's cities, towns and villages adapt to change and prepare for the future. This flexible State funding for planning and resilience can pay for a variety of eligible projects, such as:

- A new or updated municipal plan;
- New or updated bylaws that that implement Act 47 of 2023 (HOME Act) and Act 181 of 2024 (Resilience, Biodiversity & Land Use Act), including zoning & subdivision bylaws;
- Climate resilience and flood recovery projects;
- · Projects related to housing development;
- New or updated capital programs and budgets for infrastructure maintenance and improvements;
- Physical improvement plans or other planning for a State Designation in coordination with Department of Housing & Community Development program staff; and
- Projects that support communities for all ages that align with Age Strong Vermont: A Roadmap for an Age-friendly State.

Individual towns may apply for up to \$30,000, and multi-town applications (a consortium) may apply for up to \$45,000. A local cash match of 10% of the total project costs is required, except for zoning/subdivision bylaw projects in municipalities without zoning/subdivision bylaws.

Please review the <u>Program Description</u> for eligibility requirements and the <u>Application</u> <u>Guide</u> for application questions. A wide variety of municipalities access this funding, including the Vermont's <u>smallest towns</u>.

Application Schedule for FY2025 Grants:

- Regional Planning Commission confirmation of municipal planning process (to be eligible to apply for projects other than a municipal plan): December 31, 2024
- Online application opens for use: January 27, 2025
- Application Deadline: March 31 @ 6:00 p.m., 2025
- Award Decisions: April 30, 2025
- Project completion: April 30, 2027 (2-year grant term to complete a project)

Downtown Transportation Fund

The Department of Housing and Community Development is pleased to announce the availability of the Downtown Transportation Fund (DTF) to support revitalization efforts in Designated Downtowns and eligible Designated Village Centers.

Eligibility for Designated Village Centers

The Downtown Transportation Fund has expanded eligibility to Designated Village Centers that have participated in the **Better Connections Program** and Designated Village Centers within Chittenden County that have completed a comprehensive downtown/village center/community area planning process with public input, comparable to the Better Connections Program. See the program application for a full list of eligible municipalities.

Application Deadline: February 17, 2025 @ 5:00 pm

Please note that the application includes a preliminary project review by Historic Preservation, which **must be submitted at least 30 days in advance** of the application deadline.

See the **2025 Downtown Transportation Fund Guidance and Application** for complete details of the program. The maximum grant amount is \$200,000 with a 20% match requirement.

Better Connections Program

The Better Connections Program provides technical assistance and funds to local communities to help them achieve their goals and plan for growth. The program funds planning efforts to increase multi-modal transportation options and to improve

land use, water quality, public health, and economic vitality in Vermont communities.

The Program is open to new applications biennially. A 10% local cash match is required. The Program funds physical plans focusing on:

- improved multimodal connectivity;
- active transportation and complete streets;
- · access management;
- · traffic calming;
- parking;
- wayfinding;
- rehabilitation of buildings;
- · redevelopment of sites;
- housing;
- land use planning;
- stormwater management.

- January 24: <u>Pre-Application Form</u> and Meeting Deadline
- February 21: Application Deadline

Program

AARP Community Challenge grants

AARP Vermont invites local eligible non-profit organizations and governments across the state to apply for the 2025 AARP Community Challenge grant program, now through March 5, 2025, at 5:00 p.m. AARP Community Challenge grants fund quick-action projects that help communities become more livable by improving public places, transportation, housing, digital connections, and more.

This year, the AARP Community Challenge is accepting applications across three different grant opportunities:

- Capacity-building microgrants are paired with additional resources, such as one-on-one coaching from national nonprofit organizations, webinars, cohort learning opportunities and more for improving walkability, bikeability; implementing safe, accessible home modifications; and disaster preparedness training.
- Demonstration grants fund projects that encourage replication of exemplary local efforts. This
 year's focus is on improving pedestrian safety with funding support from Toyota Motor North
 America; expanding high-speed internet access and adoption with funding support from
 Microsoft; reconnecting communities divided by infrastructure; and implementing housing
 choice design competitions.
- Flagship grants support projects that improve public places; transportation; housing; digital connections; and community resilience.
